The goal of the MARA project is to document the current distributions of Maryland's amphibian and reptile species using a systematic and repeatable approach. The Atlas will establish a baseline for future efforts to determine changes in the distribution of amphibians and reptiles in Maryland. The information gained through your volunteer effort will be used to promote the conservation and protection of Maryland's 90+ species of frogs, toads, turtles, lizards, snakes and salamanders. Understanding the current distribution patterns of amphibians and reptiles within the state is needed to create effective conservation strategies.
